Activities with Other Organisations

Purpose

To consider the CCSBT's relationship with CCAMLR, and to brief the Extended Commission on interactions with other organisations during 2009 and proposals for 2010.

Relationship with CCAMLR

At CCSBT15, the Extended Commission noted that:

"...CCSBT needed to formalise and agree with the Commission for the Conservation of Antarctic Marine Living Resources (CCAMLR) the applicable management measures for SBT fishing to be undertaken in the CCAMLR Convention Area, consistent with the CCAMLR convention."

Discussion of this matter has been underway within the CCSBT and between the CCSBT and CCAMLR since CCSBT12 (October 2005). To progress matters further, the Secretariat drafted and circulated an "Arrangement between CCSBT and CCAMLR" during 2009 for Member's consideration. Members have provided intersessional comments on the draft, but final agreement has yet to be reached. The current version of the draft, together with the latest amendments received¹ (shown as tracked changes) is provided at Attachment A. The main part of the draft that appears to require further discussion is section 2(iii).

Activities with other organisations in 2009

The Executive Secretary represented the Extended Commission at the following meetings since CCSBT 15:

- COFI 28; the 2nd Meeting of the Regional Secretariat's Network; and a meeting of the Tuna RFMO Secretariats (Rome, March 2009);
- The Second Joint Meeting of Tuna RFMOs and a meeting of the Tuna RFMO Secretariats (San Sebastian, July 2009).

In addition, the Secretariat is in regular contact with the Secretariats of the other tuna RFMOs on matters of mutual interest, including MCS measures (transhipment, VMS), the global register of tuna vessels and other matters on an ad-hoc basis.

Proposed activities with other organisations for 2010

Known meetings of interest to the Extended Commission are:

- The 6th Steering Committee meeting of the Fisheries Resources Monitoring System (FIRMS) and the 23rd meeting of the Coordinating Working Party on Fisheries Statistics (CWP) (Hobart, Australia, ~February 2010).
- Four intersessional workshops to be held during 2010 as recommended at the 2nd Joint Meeting of Tuna RFMOs (Kobe2). These workshops are:
 - 1. RFMO management of tuna fisheries, with an emphasis on reducing overcapacity (potentially hosted by the Forum Fisheries Agency);
 - 2. Improvement, harmonisation and compatibility of MCS measures, including monitoring catches from catching vessels to markets (potentially hosted by Japan);
 - 3. Tuna RFMO management issues relating to by-catch and to call on RFMOs to avoid duplication of work on this issue (United States); and
 - 4. A meeting of experts to share best practices on the provision of scientific advice (potentially hosted by the European Community).
- Meetings of the Tuna RFMO Secretariats (held in conjunction with the above intersessional workshops arising from Kobe2).
- Annual meetings of other tuna regional bodies.
- CCAMLR annual meeting.

It is proposed to continue the practice of deciding whether to attend meetings of interest on the basis of the specific interests of the CCSBT in the agendas.

The budget prepared for 2010 provides for participation in the FIRMS/CWP meeting and 3 of the 4 workshops arising from Kobe2 (i.e. MCS, ERS and Science).

Attachment A

Arrangement between The Commission for the Conservation of Southern Bluefin Tuna and The Commission for the Conservation of Antarctic Marine Living Resources

The Commission for the Conservation of Southern Bluefin Tuna (hereafter CCSBT) and the Commission for the Conservation of Antarctic Marine Living Resources (hereafter CCAMLR)₂;

NOTING that the objective of the Convention for the Conservation of Southern Bluefin Tuna (hereafter CSBT Convention) is to ensure, through appropriate management, the conservation and optimum utilisation of southern bluefin tuna;

NOTING FURTHER that the objective of the Convention on the Conservation of Antarctic Marine Living Resources (hereafter CAMLR Convention) is the conservation of Antarctic marine living resources, which includes rational use;

RECOGNISING that under the CSBT Convention, CCSBT claims competence over southern bluefin throughout its migratory range;

NOTING that Article 12 of the CSBT Convention requires the CCSBT to collaborate with other inter-governmental organisations which have related objectives to, among other things, obtain the best available information including scientific information to further the attainment of the objective of the <u>CSBT</u> Convention and seek to avoid duplication with respect to the work of the other organisations;

NOTING FURTHER that the Preamble to the CAMLR Convention recognises that it is desirable for CCAMLR to establish suitable machinery for recommending, promoting, deciding on and co-ordinating the measures and scientific studies needed to ensure the conservation of Antarctic marine living organisms;

CONSIDERING that Article II of the CAMLR Convention requires that any harvesting and associated activities in the CAMLR Convention Area shall be conducted in accordance with that Convention's provisions and with the specified principles of conservation which include, *inter alia*, maintenance of the ecological relationship between harvested, dependent and related populations of Antarctic marine living resources;

NOTING that provisions of the CAMLR Convention addresses the conservation of nontarget, associated or dependent species which belong to the same ecosystem as the target species;

NOTING FURTHER that the Preamble to the 2008 CCSBT Recommendation to Mitigate the Impact on Ecologically Related Species of Fishing for Southern Bluefin Tuna identifies that the CCSBT is determined to mitigate incidental harm to ecologically related species caused by fishing for southern bluefin tuna;

DESIRING to put into place arrangements and procedures to promote cooperation in order to enhance the conservation and rational use of stocks and species which are within the competence and/or <u>of</u> mutual interest of both organisations so as to avoid duplication or conflict between the activities of the two organisations;

NOW THEREFORE the CCSBT and CCAMLR record the following understandings:

1. OBJECTIVE OF THIS ARRANGEMENT

The objective of this Arrangement is to facilitate, where appropriate, cooperation between the CCSBT and CCAMLR ('the Commissions') with a view to enhancing the conservation and rational use of stocks and species which are of interest to both the Commissions.

2. JURISDICTIONCOMPETENCE

The Commissions understand that:

- (i) The CCSBT is the appropriate body to develop and implement conservation and management measures for southern bluefin tuna;
- (ii) Within the CAMLR eConvention area, CCAMLR is the appropriate body to develop and implement conservation and management measures for all other marine living resources that fall within its the CAMLR eConvention; and
- (iii) While CCSBT has competence of southern bluefin tuna throughout its migratory range, <u>CCSBT</u>-vessels <u>of CCSBT members</u> will <u>be expected to respect comply with</u> CCAMLR's conservation and management measures in the <u>CCAMLR eConvention</u> <u>Aarea</u>.

3. AREAS OF COOPERATION

The Commissions will establish and maintain consultation and cooperation in respect of matters of common interest-to both organisations, in the following areas:

- (i) Exchange of meeting reports, information, documents and publications regarding matters of mutual interest, consistent with the information sharing policies of each Commission.
- (ii) Exchange of data and scientific information of common interest-to both Commissions, consistent with the information sharing policies of each Commission. In addition:
 - CCSBT will provide a report each year to CCAMLR covering the stock assessment of southern bluefin tuna for that year; and the latest southern bluefin tuna catch data classified by ocean, gear and catching country; and
 - CCAMLR will provide a report to the CCSBT each year detailing any catches (by flag and gear) of southern bluefin tuna from vessels fishing under CCAMLR's jurisdiction.
- (iii) Where appropriate, collaborating on analyses and research efforts relating to species of mutual interest.
- (i<u>vii</u>) Consider<u>ation on</u> methods of recognising and cooperating with each other's conservation and management measures.
- (iv) Consistent with each Commission's rules of procedure, granting of permanent reciprocal observer status to representatives of the respective Commissions in relevant meetings of each Commission respectively.

4. CONSULTATIVE PROCESS

To facilitate effective development, implementation and enhancement of cooperation, the Commissions may establish a consultative process between the two respective Secretariats that includes, telephone, email and similar means of communications. The consultative process may also proceed in the margins of meetings at which <u>both-the</u> Commissions' Secretariats are represented by appropriate staff.

5. MODIFICATION

This Arrangement may be modified at any time by the mutual written consent of both-the Commissions.

<u>56</u>. LEGAL STATUS

This Arrangement does not create <u>any</u> legally binding rights <u>and or</u> obligations.

This Arrangement does not alter the obligations of members of either body to comply with the <u>conservation and</u> management and conservation measures of those bodies.

67. OTHERS

- (i) The cooperation under this Arrangement will commence on the date of signature.
- (ii) Either Commission may <u>end the cooperation underterminate</u> this Arrangement by giving six months prior written notice to the other Commission.
- (iii) The cooperation under this Arrangement will continue to operate for three (3) years. At that stage the Commissions will review the operation of the Arrangement and decide whether it will be renewed.
