Report from the Compliance Committee

Purpose

To consider the report and recommendations of the Compliance Committee.

Discussion

The independent Chair of the Compliance Committee will present the report of the Compliance Committee's meeting, which is to be held from 11-13 October 2018.

The Compliance Committee will be considering a wide variety of matters, including:

- Reports from the Secretariat and Members on compliance related matters and an assessment of Members compliance with CCSBT management measures.
- Consideration of any actions required under the Corrective Actions Policy.
- Reports on any updates or problems with the operation of CCSBT's measures, including consideration of a Draft IUU Vessel List if required.
- Review and revision of CCSBT MCS measures with the intention of ensuring that these measures are operating effectively and efficiently and are updated as appropriate. The measures to be considered include aspects of:
 - o Catch Documentation Scheme (CDS);
 - o Vessel Monitoring System (VMS); and
 - o Minimum Standards for Inspection in Port.
- Consideration of CCSBT Plans, Policies and Arrangements, including:
 - o The Compliance Action Plan;
 - o Minimum Performance Requirements;
 - o Corrective Actions Policy;
 - o MCS Information Collection and Sharing Policy;
 - o Ouality Assurance Reviews;
 - o Template for Annual Report to the CC and EC;
 - o Transhipment MoC with WCPFC; and
 - o International Networks and Bilateral Arrangements.
- Action planned as part of the implementation of the CCSBT's Compliance Plan, including:
 - o Review of Compliance Risks; and
 - o Potential Formalised Compliance Assessment Process.
- Review of the implementation of CCSBT's ERS Recommendation.
- Proposal for an On-line Data Submission/ Data Access Project.
- A possible project on the use of AIS data to assess risks of undeclared SBT transhipments at sea and of IUU fishing for SBT.
- The Compliance Committee's work program for 2019.

Recommendations may be made on these matters, which will require the attention of the Extended Commission.
