## **Report from the Compliance Committee**

## **Purpose**

To consider the report and recommendations of the Compliance Committee.

## **Discussion**

The independent Chair of the Compliance Committee will present the report of the Compliance Committee's meeting, which is to be held from 5-8 October 2021.

The Compliance Committee will be considering a wide variety of matters, including:

- Reports from the Secretariat and Members on compliance related matters and an assessment of Members' compliance with CCSBT management measures.
- Consideration of COVID-19 related issues.
- Consideration of any actions required under the Corrective Actions Policy.
- Consideration of recommendations from the Technical Compliance Working Group (TCWG) potentially including next steps with respect to the development of an electronic CDS (eCDS) and improvements to CDS tag specifications
- A review of progress on 2021 Workplan items.
- Reports on any updates or problems with the operation of CCSBT's measures.
- Consideration of the Attributable SBT Catch definition and depredation.
- Implementation of the CCSBT's Compliance Plan, including:
  - Outcomes of intersessional discussion on a potential formalised compliance assessment process.
  - o Consideration of the QAR of the EU and the future need for QARs.
  - o Update and discussion of the market research proposal.
  - o Revisions to the CDS Resolution.
  - Standing items for which updated information may be available, including electronic monitoring systems.
- Consideration of CCSBT Plans, Policies and Arrangements, including:
  - Updated Minimum Performance Requirements for Ecologically Related Species.
  - o Update on CCSBT's compliance relationships with other organisations.
- Progress with the On-line Data Submission/ Data Access Project and development of a trial eCDS.
- Progress with a proposal to enhance the implementation of seabird mitigation measures
- The Compliance Committee's work program for 2022.

Recommendations may be made on these matters, which will require the attention of the Extended Commission.
